# Meeting Recaps

## January Zoom meeting with Eden Compton

Eden Compton fortunately gave a Zoom presentation for our January meeting as the weather outside was miserable. She gave a very comprehensive explanation with slides and a video about color and how to apply color in our own work. She talked about the properties of color, harmony, how to mix colors/neutrals, limiting your palette and exploring and experimenting with color. The properties of color are: Hue: color family, Chroma; saturation or intensity of the color, Value: dark or lightness of the color, Temperature: warm colors and cool colors. To increase your color confidence she suggests learning to identify colors properly, and using a color wheel is a good place to start. Memorize the compliments of colors and mix neutrals for all hues on your palette.



Make color charts using a limited palette, and experiment with different palettes, and adding colors to the palette. Look at a favorite painting that you like and try to figure out how the artist mixed the colors used in the painting. Most importantly she encouraged keeping a sketch book with your experiments!

# February Member Critique with Oscar-Alberto Bográn



At the last meeting, Oscar Bogran provided a unique and enjoyable critique experience to our members. He emphasized the importance of framing the image for the viewer even an abstract painting. When painting a portrait, he focused the importance of the cultural aspects of the sitter which could resulted in cultural appropriation in some instances. Oscar mentioned that he used a water sprayer while working in acrylics, to keep the paint wet, then members discussed the use of Open acrylic mediums to produce the same results.



He then focused on a lovely watercolor composed of intrinsic details which he said was unusual. He suggested oil colors applied with palette knives to provide a Van Gogh look.

A still life in acrylic was critiqued for the light and shadows, especially the blacks in the background. The use of contrast in very important to create a sense of depth. Sometimes trees need to be lightened or darkened to emphasis the contrast. Faces in portraits need more details. Oscar was delighted to find an acrylic of old dead trees painted on the other side of a map of Buffalo. He talked about imaginary worlds, back stories and time is fleeting in the shadows of the trees. All in all, an interesting critique and he offered us new ways to enjoy the creative process. *Jacqueline Smith*

# Problem Solving in Your Creative Expressions By member Sal Aiello

I don't know about you but there are times when I take to my "contemplation recliner" in my studio and sit and stare at a canvas nearly done, or just begun, and question what went so wrong. It's never what went so right and "Yippee" another one done that I don't mind hanging in a show. When it works, and all the pieces jibe, it is transcendent.



Painting, and art in general, is a series of problem solving, that I firmly believe, is tougher than any math or science problem. Having taught art in its many guises for over 35 years, from elementary, middle and high school to ending my career teaching college, I have witnessed the anxiety and desperation many students face as they work on a canvas. What's the cause for this distress? Many times it relates back to the beginning concept and inception of a painting. Poor composition. Poor choice of colors. Hurried drawing and not enough sit back and think about what you really wish to accomplish.

Getting a painting from inside your head to the canvas can be a life altering event. There have been many times I would awaken from a nights rest with a fully formed image in my head and I can't wait to get to my easel with a fresh canvas ready to go. That's when it all falls apart ... or not.

I have to remind myself to get out a sketch pad and draw, yes draw, out my idea in as many views as possible. Slow down cowboy. Take a breath or second cup of coffee before you commit. It's well worth it. Believe me I've messed too many canvases not to know.

However, when you awaken in the middle night with your hand holding an imaginary paint brush, laying down strokes on your dream canvas have at it, friend. Inspiration waits 'for no man.

This is meant as an opening salvo on problem solving. Next month we'll delve into composition more fully. "Once upon a time in your wildest dreams!"

ART must approve submissions prior to artwork delivery. ART reserves the right to decline works that are physically unstable, could pose a risk to public safety, or could contain content not aligned with a general audience.
